Parent Information Evenings

TMET will host its next PIE at 7pm on Wednesday 15 February at Bellevue School. PIEs are used to provide information for new families considering Montessori-based primary education and attendance is an enrolment prerequisite. The evenings provide an insight into what happens in the Montessori classroom, with teachers and students on hand to share their experiences and answer questions.

Parent Education Evenings (PEEs), by contrast, are targeted at parents of enrolled children. They provide teachers with the opportunity to speak about more specific Montessori topics.

Montessori Education for all the Family

Congratulations, you have made the decision to explore Montessori education for your child. Montessori education is for all the children in your family.

Choosing Montessori is more than an education philosophy, it is a way of life. Something important to consider is that Montessori is for all members of your family, not just the 'chosen' child. Give every member of your family the option of this journey. If you are considering Montessori for one particular child now is the time to change your mind. Montessori becomes a way of life, not only a way of education. Imagine the impact of choosing one child to attend Montessori and the other in mainstream - their journey and life experience will be so incredibly different. The Montessori child will be given the gift of becoming who they were always meant to be, their inner drive and interests will be nurtured, they will become collaborative learners, they will be self directed learners, they will find joy in their work, they will be respected by their peers and teachers, they will build strong self esteem and be prepared for a world that does not exist vet. To give the gift of Montessori education to only certain children seems incredibly unfair and may have a lasting impact on your family. If you are unsure or have any questions please talk to any member of our teaching team and do some of your own research.

We have an expectation that all members of your family will attend Montessori primary school.





Understanding the 9-12 Classroom and why the Final Year is the Icing on the Cake

As parents you have made the commitment to step outside the box. You have been brave in your decision and weathered the storm of questions; Why is your child staying at pre school until they are 6 years old? Won't your child be left behind starting school so late? What will they do when they get to high school? As we all know the questions are endless.

You have given your child the gift of a well rounded education that has been around for over 100 years and one that serves the specific needs of the child at each stage of development. This education is based on scientific fact. It allows children to achieve the full potential that lies within each and every one of them.

Rewind back ... to the 5-6 year old. The final year of the first phase of development. During this final year at pre school the child consolidates all previous learning. They experience huge growth in confidence, a sense of where they fit into their environment, what their strengths are and what they enjoy doing. They become proficient in their command of the English language, they are true leaders in their environment, they handle responsibility - and they do all this with ease. This is all designed to happen in the final plane of development. We can all look back in hindsight and truly acknowledge this year and what it has given to the child.

Primary school as we know it here in NZ ends at the end of year 6. From here the child moves to intermediate for year 7 and 8. A couple of important facts to remember; intermediate is primary school and the teachers are primary school teachers. It may look like intermediate offers the child more opportunities but in fact the final year at Montessori offers so much more. The planes of development are based on science. The educational approach is based on science. This final year of the second phase of development is the key year, the consolidation year, the year that everything comes together, the year that the child becomes a true leader, the year that social, emotional, physical and academics all come together. In the words of Steven Arnold, "Why take the cake out of the oven before it is fully cooked?" The Montessori teachers know your child so well, they are knowledgeable in the needs of your child at each stage and the final year is carefully designed by them to meet the specific needs of each child in their group.

Changing hearts and minds, changing cultures, making the best decisions for our children. As a team everyone believes in your child and is committed to them graduating from Montessori in the final year.





Natural Consequences

We do not use punishment as a means of discipline. Instead we believe in natural and logical consequences.

Natural consequence is the natural follow-up of any event that has no external interference. When you stand in the rain, you get wet. Experience becomes the teacher and adult interference is not required.

Logical consequences refer to the actions or responses that are implemented following a child's inappropriate behaviour that serve to discourage the child from engaging in that behaviour again. Logical consequences teach children to accept responsibility for their mistakes and misbehaviour. Logical consequences are not punishment and they need to be related to the behaviour, respectful to the child and reasonable (no matter how cross you may be).

For example: if you forget about the food in the oven it burns. This is the natural consequence of forgetting the timer. The logical consequence will be that another casserole needs to be baked or that something else needs to be made for dinner.

This discipline is real, in contrast to the artificial discipline of reward and punishment common to other methods.

It is one of our ultimate goals that our students do the right thing, not because they will be punished if they don't but because they don't want to adversely affect the people and world around them.

Q&A: The New Classrooms at M@B

TMET and the junior teaching team are looking forward to moving into the new classrooms in T1 2017.

• What is a key teacher?

Each child has a key teacher. This is someone that you and your child can identify with, a go to person. The teaching team are collaborative and work together and your child will benefit from all the teachers in their environment.

• Why has my child's key teacher changed?

The teacher/child ratio has dropped with the introduction of JayJay as a junior teacher. The classroom was divided up into three groups with a mix of age groups in each group.

• Will my child be separated from their friends in the new classroom?

No. The three new classrooms are in an open block. It is an open plan learning space so all children will be together much as they are now.
