Writing from the Senior Class

The year sevens, Clara, Indya-Rose, Lily, Jasmine, Toby, Dominic, went on a tramp. There isn't much to tell about the way back because going the same way we came kinda just flew by, as we had already seen everything.

When we left we were all in a good mood, ready for the 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ km walk back to the cars. Most of the track was reasonably dry but some parts were quite muddy, as it had been raining the night before.
